The combined BIGG and Mid North High Rainfall Zone Bus trip to the Fleurieu occurred on the 18th March with 14 participants heading down to visit three different innovative properties in the Sellicks Hill/Myponga area.

The following points provide an overview of each property visited:

Alastair Just-composite ewes and Angus cows

- Pioneer in sheep containment having built a containment lot 15-20 years ago.
- Currently has 3700 ewes in containment. Ewes go into containment early in the year and then will stay there until 2 weeks after the break, they then go out into his hills country which still has dry feed/have not been overgrazed for lambing
- Mates in containment at 1%. Scans at 170%, marks at 150%
- Big focus on low feed costs in containment, including feeding 100% grapemarc diet at times. Currently ewes being fed a mix of grapemarc and potatoes
- Has permanent irrigation (lucerne based pasture) which he uses to grow out lambs

Samatha Martin- Family dairy farm.

- -Recent focus on refencing to smaller paddocks (2ha size was up to 14ha) for rotational grazing, including building a laneway which has access to each paddock.
- Interest in mixed species and for first time last spring sowed a 11 species summer mix across 17ha of

provided both a feed cost and labour saving (in past she would have had to feed out oaten hay and silage to sustain the heifers over summer)

Nobles (Chad Baker) - Cattle and composite sheep operation. - High capital being spent across property new fencing, new containment, centre pivots, pasture renovation, new feeders

- Trading operation of 10,000 lambs/yr on irrigated pastures. Has 4 pivots, 30-40ha each sown down to a mix of annuals (Concord ryegrass/chicory/plantain/clover), but looking to instead sow to perennials in
- Rotational grazing of lambs under pivots, on a 20 day grazing rotation

This bus trip was funded by the Red Meat & Wool Livestock Technology Group. Thanks to all of the producers who opened up their gates and shared their systems with others, the learning opportunities and networking provide a huge benefit to other producers.

Containment Ewe Project Update



Monitoring of containment ewes is continuing this year for the MLA funded PDS across three major sites. Ewes will be monitored at Keyneton Station, Ryan Foulis's and William Hurn's. They will be monitored for condition score, rations formulated, and cost of feeding assessed as well as ground cover and feed on offer monitored in the paddocks.

Along with the containment ewe project an additional project has been funded by MLA looking at the health status of ewe's in containment. Across two of the sites, we will be blood testing ewes for mineral status as they enter containment, during the containment feeding period and prior to them being let out into the paddock. We will be looking for calcium and magnesium deficiency associated with grain feeding. We will then be tracking ewe mortality across the sites and assessing this against their risk of metabolic disease as shown by their blood results.

Tarac Technologies

O Acti-Meal – SARDI Sheep Feed Rations Trial

The objective of a trial conducted by SARDI was to investigate the impacts of feeding Tarac **CActi-Meal** made from processed grape marc, on sheep performance, permissible meat functional fatty acid claims, retail display and sensory characteristics.

Feeding Tarac Acti-Meal at up to 25% of the pelletised ration for 2 months prior to processing resulted in perceived improvement by a trained sensory panel. "Mutton with prior exposure to a dry pasture followed by the Acti-Meal pelletised diet were significantly higher in 'buttery' flavour and oily mouth coating aftertaste."

In addition, there were no significant differences in retail colour of loins which also tended to have a reduced tendency for oxidation after 48 hours.

Interested in giving it a go? Local Daveyston feed mill, Laucke Mills, use Acti-Meal in a number of their sheep rations.
